**Dutch Still-Life Bouquets:** The list offered is a general guideline. You are the designer... add or substitute as you wish.

**Container:** There is no limit in the choice of container. Use everything & any object as long as it holds water with an opening between 4" to 5" wide. Dutch Still-Life calls for a pedestal vase in metal or ceramic if possible. Check out <a href="mailto:trishosullivandesign.com">trishosullivandesign.com</a> for great ideas in repurposed containers.

The trick of great design is a container with an opening no larger than 5"- I use 4" to 5".

Please fill the container ¾ with cool water 1 roll of clear ½" florist tape or any strong scotch tape Cotton rag or paper towel Floral clippers, knife and scissors Water tubs Wooden skewer sticks

# **Bouquet Ingredients Breakdown**

When selecting flowers from a store-bought bouquet, aim for a balanced composition using the three key floral elements: focal flowers, complementary flowers, and accent flowers.

## 1. Focal Flowers (The Showstoppers – Large, Eye-Catching Blooms)

These flowers create the centerpiece of the arrangement and draw the most attention.

# • Examples:

- o Roses Large head jewel tone monochromatic colors
- o Ranunculus jewel tone
- o Dahlias jewel tone

## 2. Complementary Flowers (Adds Volume and Depth)

These flowers create depth and spotlight focal flowers.

## • Examples:

- Cushion and Button Mums
- o Mini Carnations

### 3. Accent Material (Adds Movement & Interest – Unique or Textured Blooms)

These flowers give the design a personal touch, creating interest.

## • Examples:

- o Artichoke green or purple
- o Brown Hypericum Berries
- o Purple Kale

## 4. Botanical Material (The Supporting Cast – Adds Texture & Completes Design)

These botanical materials balance the design, frame the flowers, and set the design style.

## • Examples:

- o Vines
- o Birch leaves
- o Purple Wax Flower
- o Ivy

# **Vase Choices**

When selecting a vase, consider the **size of the opening** to ensure proper stem support and proportion for the arrangement. Here are some commonly used vases:

## 3. Ceramic, Metal Urn or Compote Container (Elegant Modern Garden )

- Size Options & Opening:
  - o **Small:** 5" diameter (Opening: 4-5")
  - o **Medium:** 8" diameter (Opening: 6-7")
- **Best for:** Soft, rounded arrangements, casual or romantic styles

## 2. Square Vase (Contemporary & Compact)

- Size Options & Opening:
  - o **Small:** 4" x 4" x 4" (Opening: 3.5-4")
  - o **Medium:** 5" x 5" x 5" (Opening: 4-5")
  - o **Large:** 6" x 6" x 6" (Opening: 5-6")
- **Best for:** Tight, compact arrangements, modern aesthetics

## 1. Cylinder Vase (Classic & Versatile)

- Size Options & Opening:
  - o **Short:** 4" x 4" (Opening: 3-4")
  - o **Medium:** 6" x 4" (Opening: 4-5")
  - o **Tall:** 10" x 4" (Opening: 4-5")
- Best for: Structured arrangements, tall stems, modern or minimalist designs
